We transitioned to an e-mail newsletter, and I think the *NHAS Observer* is much healthier for it. Our membership reached a record high (although I am certain that record will be demolished by mid-2001; we are growing *that* fast.)

Other changes have occurred as well. YFOS now has a Site Coordinator (Larry Lopez) who will oversee YFOS concerns throughout the year. The Membership Committee was disbanded, having felt that membership needs were being covered by the treasurer, web committee, and the club meetings. Finally, I temporarily did away with the traditional guest-speaker format at the evening programs, although I am sure

they will return to enlighten us again sometime in the near future.

I wanted to publicly thank each of the other Officers and Board Members for their support during 2000. I am often amazed at the level of talent within the club; each of the Officers and Board could easily be President of any other astronomy club. NHAS is by far the best astronomy club I've ever been involved with during my 20+ years in the hobby. It is certainly the most active and organized. Thoughts on Leaving Office

I joined NHAS in 1995 – it must be about then since I have 5 different Astronomy Day tee shirts. We had about 40 members then. The club was small, very informal, somewhat disorganized, but functioned well enough to do regular Skywatches and have regular meetings. It did most of the same things we do today, just not as big. It seems that we spent a lot of time discussing Stellafane lunch at meetings back then. Things were different.

I ran for and became a short-term board member (3 months) my first year, then moved to Vice President, then to President for 2 years, and have been Treasurer for the last 2 years.

Being in the administration of a nonprofit group has taught me much, like how to work with people, how to teach, how to file for 501c3 status, how to do books, how to schedule events, how to find guest speakers, how to make building foundations, frame, insulate,

wire, and how to abate taxes. It was an interesting and fun thing, and has helped in many odd ways in my full-time job.

I have also seen all of the planets, all of the Messier objects, two major comets (three, if you include the one that hit Jupiter), meteor showers, many NGC deep space objects including a quasar at mag. 16.7.

I have ground and polished on three different mirrors. John Dobson slept in my basement for two nights. My truck was greatly aged by its service for the club.

What other hobby gives you a good reason for staying out all night when the temperature is -10, no wind, crystal clear skies, and call it a good night?

Once a person learns a bit, they decide if the hobby is for them, and if not they move on. Others move forward and gain a general background, see the Messier objects, learn to star hop, and experience the night. Some continue further and teach, do public events, or give other service to the club. Some specialize in photography, CCD, or scope building. All of this is normal, but where do you go after all that? This is the question I have asked myself.

NHAS has grown to 175 members, it now has an impressive observatory and warming room. What more could one ask for in an Astronomy club? For me at this point, it is some time off. I have given to the club my service in fair exchange for the education it has given me, and now it is time to move on and let others have a chance to take leadership roles.

I would recommend to anyone who has the time or desire, to take on an administrative position. Prior experience is not required, just the desire to help out and in some ways make this corner of the world a little better.

I have greatly enjoyed my 5+ years in NHAS, both the ups and (some of) the downs. Though I will take a nonactive role in the club, I am glad to see that the club is in such good shape and in the hands of people that care.

Looking Back at Last Month

Opening Remarks. Just before the break, **Ed Ting** welcomed new member **Alan Shirey** who said he wanted to become more active in astronomy.

Book of the Month. Larry Lopez brought *The Story of Astronomy* by Patrick Moore.

Scope of the Month. John Pappas displayed an Orion Sky Quest 6-in. Dobsonian f/8 reflector. The base required some assembly but the instructions were good. It was difficult to collimate since it had only two adjusting screws on the mirror cell. It also took a while to cool because the mirror was not ventilated. At about \$400, John recommended it as a beginner scope. Ed **Ting** followed with a display of his homemade 6-in. Dob, whose mirror was made as an the ATM committee project. He used an 8-in. tube to allow for ventilation and rigged some Velcro (the fuzzy wooly part, not the loopy hook part) on the declination disks to dampen motion. His cost about as much in parts as the Orion scope.

Mike Pelletier had the club scope.

Committees. ATMs: Larry mentioned three items that made the process easier: the Foucault tester, an oven for preparing pitch lap, and a projection microscope. The ATMs were to meet on Nov. 26 to start polishing mirrors.

<u>Photo Comm:</u> Chase McNiss said the last meeting of the year was on Oct. 20 and they actually took astrophotos.

Observatory. Larry said that work has officially stopped for the winter,

members having become worn out from a spate of recent work sessions.

Public Observing. Ed Ting thanked all members who supported the skywatches at Reed's Ferry, NW Elementary School, and others. He went on to review upcoming skywatches.

Jim McCarthy held one at Belmont High School just before Halloween . **Bob Sletten** said he was hosting one in Bow in early December.

Treasury. Mike Stebbins reported 97 members and a balance of \$7500. The YFOS porta-potty was finally cleaned. He promised an annual statement by the December meeting.

Evening Program. Ed Ting and *All about Eyepieces*

Ed reviewed the development of eyepieces starting with the Huygenian in 1703 and the Ramsden in 1780. The acromat, a two-element lens, improved on simple lenses by reducing color distortion. The Kellner in 1849 was a three-element design.

Lens coatings were introduced to reduce

light loss through glass. Orthoscopic lenses in the 1880s were four-element lenses, multicoated, very sharp, with very low distortion. Then followed the Plossl in 1860, the Erfle in 1917 (increasing the field of view to 60-70 degrees).

The Barlow lens increased magnification without losing eye relief.



Guest Speaker Ed Ting

The Nagler lenses in the 1980s revolutionized eyepiece design by providing the widest possible field but keeping the image very sharp with little aberration. Ed said they gave a "Holy Toledo" visual effect. Nagler later introduced Panoptic eyepieces that were good for sharp, low-power viewing, and Radians in the 3-18 mm range, a series of eyepieces that all looked the same.

Other current types included Meade SWA, Meade UWA, Pentax XL, Vixen Lanthanum, Takahashi LE, and Pentax SMC XL Orthos. He concluded the talk with a Nagler Type 5 eyepiece worth \$600 and weighing over two pounds!
