President's Message

I want to again thank all of the members who participated in this year's Astronomy Day! Although the crowd was smaller than in past years, the weather held for most of the day and it seemed everyone had an enjoyable time.

The evening program for the June 8th meeting was not available at press time. We are working on several possibilities. Here is what is in the sky this month. Venus reaches greatest western elongation on the morning of June 8th. Mars reaches opposition on June 13th. However due to its orbit, the closest approach for this apparition will occur on June 21st. For those that are early risers, Saturn makes it return to morning sky during the last part of the month. The first solar eclipse of the new millennium occurs on June 21st. Sadly for us, this is a southern hemisphere event. The path of totality passes through southern portions of Africa.

Scope of the Month. Roger Greenwood presented a Discovery 12.5-in. f/5 truss-frame Dobsonian reflector with a mirror rated at 1/10 wave. The mirror cell needed a shim to stop

the mirror from shifting, mirror cool down was a few hours, and it had a few other annoying problems. He added a green laser pointer that casts a light beam visible in the dark.

Club Scope: Still with Mike Pelletier



John, Jim, and Chase discuss a solar filter **Evening Program.** Guest Speaker **Rich DeMidio** presented a talk on "Digital Photography."

Interest was sparked by a photo in a recent S&T issue. It made him wonder if photography with a handheld digital camera was feasible.

He used an Olympus C2000-Z camera with 1/2 to 1/800th second exposures and no B setting for time exposures. (Some new cameras do offer 8 second exposures.) This limited his subject matter to the Moon and large planets. Rich exhibited sample photos taken in the range of 1/500-1/250th sec. that showed decent detail. Low power eyepieces work best since they had the largest eye relief. Photos of Jupiter, Saturn, and the Moon were impressive for images taken with a handheld camera.

After the meeting many members stayed to discuss the idea further.
