AstroFest 2010

NHAS celebrates Astronomy Day each year, for the last several years in conjunction with the McAuliffe-Shepard Discovery Center's "Spacetacular Saturday" in early May. This year MSDC is expanding the event from one day to the full weekend and has rechristened it AreoSpaceFest 2010. We will be expanding our participation, too, and calling our portion of the event AstroFest 2010.

The kick-off will be a public sky watch on Friday, 30 April starting at 7:00 PM (backup date in case of overcast skies is Saturday, 1 May).

On Saturday and Sunday we will have displays both indoors and (weather permitting) outdoors. Indoors we will have displays on telescopes and astrophotography, slide shows, and a raffle in support of the NHAS educational programs. Outdoors we will be demonstrating telescopes, magnification, solar viewing in both white light and H α , and daytime viewing of Venus. We will also provide assistance to visitors who need help setting up their own telescopes.

We need volunteers to man the various exhibits and to provide the telescopes. **Ted Blank** is the coordinator for AstroFest 2010. He has sign-up sheets for all of the various activities during the weekend. Please contact Ted if you wish to volunteer.

Here is the time line for the AstroFest weekend:

Friday night's activities run from 5-10 PM. Set up for the main indoor table starts at 4 PM. The sky watch itself starts at dusk and runs officially until 10 PM (or until everyone packs up and goes home).

On Saturday and Sunday, we will operate in three shifts: 9 AM-12 PM, 12-3 PM, and 3-6 PM. The first shift will be responsible for outdoor setup; third shift is responsible for cleanup and packup. We will have a main table indoors and also an outdoor table. Planned outdoor activities are:

Solar observing Magnification display Static scope display Binocular astronomy

We also need "floaters" to wander between the exhibits, directing the public, answering questions, and generally helping out and filling in as needed.

The possibility of overnight storage of scopes and gear at the Discovery Center is being investigated.

This is a very big event—to fill all slots on all days we need over thirty volunteers! So please sign up for all jobs and slots that you can.

Donations of books, scopes, eyepieces, planispheres, meteorites, binoculars, flashlights, etc. for the raffle will be greatly appreciated.

Again, contact Ted Blank to volunteer, or if you have any questions or suggestions.

This is always a fun and rewarding event and, with the expanded format, promises to be even more so this year. See you there!

2010 Messier Marathon Postponed to April

Cloudy weather has forced the postponement of this year's club Messier Marathon event. It has been rescheduled for the evening of Friday, 9-10 April, with Saturday, 10-11 April as a backup date.

Once a year in the March/April time frame, the Sun is positioned such that it is possible from mid Northern latitudes to observe all 110 deep-sky objects in Charles Messier's famous catalog in a single evening, literally

from dusk to dawn. Attempting to do this is called "running the Messier Marathon". Here in New Hampshire we're a little too far north to get all 110 objects, but we can see nearly all of them (my personal best is 104).

Linda and Larry Lopez have again agreed to host the club's annual Messier Marathon at their home in dark-skied New Boston. The event starts at 3:00 PM and runs through the following morning.

This is one of NHAS's major social events of the year. Come whether you plan to run the Marathon, just do some random observing of your own, or simply want to hang out and socialize. Whether or not you bring a scope, this is a great opportunity to learn the sky and to see a lot of nifty deep-sky objects. And there is always plenty of good food. Be sure to mark this on your calendar!

The meeting took place on 19 February at the McAuliffe-Shepard Discovery Center.

President's Report

Rich DeMidio reported on two aspects of NHAS's public face:

Our annual Astronomy Day activities in conjunction with MSDC will take place over the May 1 weekend, and have been rechristened "AstroFest 2010" (see the article elsewhere in this issue of the *Observer*). Planning is underway.

Marc Stowbridge was interviewed in a 24 January article at boston.com on amateur observing activites in New England. Our

monthly sky watches at MSDC were described. A beautiful image of M42 by **Herb Bubert** heads up the article.

Internal to the club, Rich pointed out that the NHAS Attire page at the website is now operational. Also, Messier Marathon planning is underway. The event is scheduled to take place on 12 March at the Lopez residence in New Boston.

Board of Directors Report

The Alton sky watch on 12 February attracted about ninety people. There were four telescopes, and lots of enthusiasm and interest.

New Hampshire TechFest is 15-19 March. NHAS participated in this event last year. If we're going to participate this year, we need to get planning underway now.

Library Telescope Program

Marc Stowbridge reported that the Samuel H. Wentworth Library in Sandwich got their telescope on 19 February. Dan Reidy of Moultonboro Central School will be the foster parent. Sandwich Elementary School hosted a sky watch this past fall.


